Half were killed.

More than 200,000 hand-made, origami
Soul Boxes were made by people
across the U.S. who care about this
escalating health crisis.

**Each Box represents a person
killed or injured by gunfire.**

The Soul Box Project was created by Oregon artist Leslie Lee in the wake of the 2017 Las Vegas shooting. To really grasp the scale of the gunfire epidemic, she knew people needed to experience the numbers in a visceral way. Individuals and community groups across the country began folding Soul Boxes with the goal of a massive exhibit in Washington, D.C.

Since attaining the goal of exhibiting 200,000 Soul Boxes on the National Mall in October 2021, Soul Boxes continue to provide dramatic visual support for local initiatives--like this one--working to reduce gun violence.

**When people see the numbers,
they *feel* the magnitude
of this gunfire epidemic.**
